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Welcome to NAFOW 2024

The St. David's Society of Pittsburgh is excited to welcome the North American Festival of Wales, returning for the first time since 2009. We have many exciting and unique opportunities planned to make your 2024 Labor Day weekend one of the best yet.

Pittsburgh's Welsh heritage has a long and prominent history, and is still going strong today – from early iron and steel-making processes and a long history of coal mining, to our present-day Welsh language classes that are helping to keep the language alive, strengthening our legacy links, and fostering the flourishing interest in Welsh culture.

We're very excited to welcome talent such as 2021 Albwm Cymraeg y Flwyddyn (Welsh Album of the Year) Mared, the 2023 Osbourne Roberts winner Llinos Haf Jones, the alwayspopular Mal Pope, the combined forces of the Dunvant and Brecon mens' choirs, and a theatrical production about Amy Dillwyn of Swansea, one of the first female industrialists in Britain and, indeed, the world.

We hope you'll make it a long weekend with us. There is a Wednesday evening one-man show about Paul Robeson, the famous baritone, actor, and activist, who once said, "There is no place in the world I like more than Wales."

Thursday tours include a visit to the University of Pittsburgh

Nationality Rooms, including the Welsh Room, the design of which is based on Capel Penrhiw, which is now preserved at Sain Ffagan (St. Fagan's) open air museum in Cardiff.

The Monday tour is a unique opportunity to view two Frank Lloyd Wright houses in one afternoon, one of those, of course, arguably the most famous private home in the world: Fallingwater. The other, Kentuck Knob, though less wellknown, is no less a masterpiece. Both exemplify Wright's credo that a building should enhance rather than eclipse its natural surroundings.

Our base for the weekend is the Westin William Penn, a prime location with excellent travel links – both the Amtrak and Greyhound stations are immediately across the street, and the flyer bus from Pittsburgh International Airport has a stop one block away, as does Megabus.



Penn Avenue, which runs on the north side of the hotel, has numerous popular restaurants. Pittsburgh's famous market area, the Strip District, is a short walk.

The Saturday evening concert will be held in the August Wilson Center, also just across the street from the Westin. Hotel reservations are now open.

Hotel 101

Part of the fun of the festival is discovering a new city and host hotel and all its features. Frequent NAFOW attendees can all tell a tale or two about their NAFOW travel adventures.

There are a couple things to note for NAFOW 2024.

Hotel Address: If you are driving to Pittsburgh, make a special note of the hotel location and address and ZIP code—1000 Penn Avenue and 15222.

If you use your in-screen navigation system, it is better to enter your destination as "The Westin Pittsburgh" if you don't have the option of entering a ZIP code.

Board member Jan Batty and her husband entered the address and soon discovered that there were two 1000 Penn Avenues the wrong one landing them in a residential area nowhere near the hotel. **Hotel Elevators:** In the interest of challenging Welsh-weary NAFOW attendees, The Westin Pittsburgh has new, smart (smarter than a human, for sure) elevator controls.



After you select your elevator floor outside the elevator doors, the system picks the fastest, most convenient elevator for you. In this example, the traveler chose Floor 10 and the elevator system assigned them to Elevator D.

However, after you are inside the elevator, you cannot change your

mind and select another floor. You must step outside the elevator and start your selection process anew.

This means you cannot jump on the elevator with a friend from a different floor and choose your destination from inside the elevator. It takes a little getting used to!

Wednesday Evening Special Event—'Call Mr. Robeson'

Paul Robeson is a great and famous actor, singer and civil rights campaigner.

When over the years he gets progressively too radical and outspoken for the establishment's liking, he is branded a traitor to his country, harassed, and denied opportunities to perform or travel.

Just as physical, emotional and mental stress threaten to push him over the fine line between genius and madness, he is summoned to appear before the House Committee on Un-American Activities to give the most difficult and important performance of his career.

This roller-coaster journey through Robeson's remarkable and eventful life highlights how his pioneering and heroic (but largely forgotten) political activism led many to describe him as the forerunner of the civil rights movement.

It features much fiery oratory and some of his famous songs, including a dramatic rendition of Ol' Man River.



TAYO ALUKO Actor, Writer, Singer

Nigerian-born Tayo Aluko is based in Liverpool. While a self-employed architect, he premiered his one-man play CALL MR. ROBESON at the 2007 Edinburgh Fringe. He has since become a full time performer, taking the play to places as distant as the North West Territories of Canada, Jamaica, Nigerian, Australia and New Zealand. One highlight was a performance at New York's Carnegie Hall in February 2012. As writer-on-attachment with the Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse theatres, he developed another one-man play, JUST AN ORDINARY LAWYER which has also toured nationally and internationally. His audio-visual play, PAUL ROBESON'S LOVE SONG, written and recorded during lockdown with actors in Canada and USA, is now streaming online on Africa Theatre to Your Home.

Turn to festivalofwales.org to read more about his latest productions based on the writings of African American Langston Hughes, and the life, music and African roots of the British composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor; his vocal performances; his development of a film on the history of West Africa; and many, many published writings; as well as his projects currently in the works.

Mal Pope Joins Weekend Line-up

Mal Pope was born in Brynhyfryd, Swansea, Wales, into a family of teachers. He began learning to play the guitar at age seven and was soon writing songs.

In the early 1970s Pope sent a tape of songs to BBC Radio 1 presenter John Peel who invited Pope to perform at the BBC. The session resulted in a recording contract with Elton John's record label, The Rocket Record Company.

Whilst studying at Christ's College, Cambridge, he spent much of his holidays recording in London. After leaving Cambridge, Pope moved to London and signed to Harvey Goldsmith's management company AMP. He signed a record deal with Larry Page, wrote songs for Cliff Richard and The Hollies, duetted with Bonnie Tyler and Aled Jones, and toured with Art Garfunkel and Belinda Carlisle.

Pope hosted The Mal Pope Show, a late-night music chat show for HTV, in the 1990s, with the show winning a Welsh BAFTA award in 1995. He went on to host a late-night talk show on HTV called Heaven's Sound, which won an award at the New York Film and Television Awards in 2001.

Mal also makes for an incredible guest, able to regale audiences with stories of Christmas parties and games of Subbuteo with Elton John, of how his sound has been influenced by the soulfulness of the Deep South, befriending the man who invited Dr. Martin Luther King to Memphis in 1968, and how he came to sing one of the most iconic TV themes of all time, 'Fireman Sam.'

Mal is celebrating his Golden Anniversary with events from October 2023 through Octobert 2024. To celebrate the 50th anniversary of his first BBC Radio 1 session, MPH Records is releasing six songs recorded by the 13-year-old Maldwyn Pope in

1973 which all featured on his first Radio One Session.

Mal says 'It's a special anniversary but while I like visiting the past I don't want to live there. It will be great to share so many wonderful stories over the coming months, but my real focus is on creating new music.'

Welsh Solo Talent for NAFOW 2024

Mared is an actor and musician from Llannefydd in North Wales. Having studied music at the University of Leeds, she went on to follow her passion for theatre with an MA at The Royal Academy of Music, leading to her covering Eponine in the West End's reworked production of 'Les Miserables' in 2019-2022. During the COVID pandemic, Mared joined the *Welsh of the West End* group that has performed in concerts in many venues, including the Royal Albert Hall.

In 2021 Mared's debut bilingual folk/pop album, 'Y Drefn,' was awarded Welsh Album of The Year. Since then she has performed her original music with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, at Sony Hall in New York and, with her band, to sold-out shows across London and Wales.

Mared played the role of Clara in the European Premiere of Mark Blitzstein's 'No For An Answer' at the Arcola Theatre in Dalston Junction. Mared was part of the 'Branwen: Dadeni' journey from early development stages in 2021, and played Branwen in the powerful story at Wales Millennium Centre and across Wales.

2024 National Gymanfa Ganu

The 92nd National Gymanfa Ganu will be held at the First English Evangelical Lutheran Church, conducted by Jon Rogers, Musical Director of the Dunvant Male Choir, and accompanied by David Enlow. The church is located at 615 Grant Street.



Organist **David Enlow**, who is also a teacher and conductor, is based in New York, and is active in concert and church music in North America and Europe. David has taught church music, service playing, improvisation, and organ repertoire master classes for local, regional, and national events of the American Guild of Organists (AGO), the Royal Canadian College of Organists, and at the Juilliard School, from which he received two degrees.



David serves as Assistant Conductor and repetiteur to the Clarion Choir and has appeared in most all of New York's major concert halls as an accompanist at the piano with choruses, solo singers, and in performances of chamber music. In early music, David is also organist of the Clarion Music Society, and appears with various groups at the organ, harpsichord, and fortepiano.

He has been one of the NAFOW accompanists since 2012, playing previously in Columbus, Rochester, Alexandria and Philadelphia.

NAFOW Seminars

That isn't how it's supposed to end: rewriting the history of medieval Wales

This talk begins with how it was and then imagines how it could have been. It places the ambush and murder of Llywelyn ap Gruffydd within the context of Welsh history, traces its origins and consequences, and then asks what if? What would the world have been like had Llywelyn lived?



With over a million books sold to date, **Sarah Woodbury** is the author of more than forty novels, all set in medieval Wales. While her ancestry is Welsh, she only visited Wales for the first time at university. She has been in love with the country, language, and people ever since. She even convinced her husband to give

all four of their children Welsh names.

Amy Dillwyn, a Renaissance Woman of Wales Subject to change

Introducing Amy Dillwyn--the world's first woman industrialist. A true renaissance woman, Amy Dillwyn worked for suffrage, campaigned for workers' rights (despite owning the factory!), penned novels still in print, composed music, and, well-educated, was fluent in several languages. Born into wealthy 1845 Swansea society, Amy Dillwyn chafed against Victorian restrictions on women. She was ahead of her time in challenging gender norms by living as she pleased and exploring LGBTQ themes in her novels. She made a strong impact on her own times and serves as an inspiration to the present.



A Pittsburgh area native of Welsh descent and a lawyer, **Taylor Williams** holds a J.D. in law, a B.S. in Education and an M.A. in Writing and Editing, as well as an M.A. in Theatre Arts. Taylor's theatre work includes classical training at the Royal National Theatre, London, and residence at Theatr

Horzycy in Toruń, Poland. A member of Actors' Equity, Taylor has performed over the years in regional theatre productions, and she interprets Alice Paul, the suffrage leader, lawyer, and author of the Equal Rights Amendment in educational programs throughout the country for The American Historical Theatre.

Singing the Hymns of Caradog Roberts

Following up with the interest from the 2023 Lincoln presentation on Welsh composer Caradog Roberts, in this session the primary focus will be to sing some of his hymns, beyond Rachie and In Memoriam, that are found in our hymnal. The session will start with a brief overview biography of Caradog Roberts by the presenter. Then information gathered about individual hymns will be shared before singing each song for greater context and appreciation. A conductor and piano accompanist will assist with the singing. Music will be provided.



Michael Hieber is a retired emeriti faculty from Miami University (Ohio). He has been a regular participant at various cymanfoedd canu across the U.S. since 2001 and at NAFOW since 2006. Learning about and singing hymns is one of his passions and starting with the March/April 2022 issue, he began writing a regular article for

Ninnau called Notes on a Hymn Page. At the 2023 Lincoln NAFOW, he presented a seminar entitled: Rachie and Composer Caradog Roberts.

Music, memory, and markers of Welsh identity in North America today

This presentation shares the results of a recent study conducted online from 2020-2022 among Welsh-descended North Americans. The results offer insights into the structure of Welsh cultural identity and the session will compare this new data with interview data from past festivals (2009-2013) and ongoing research in Wales. This presentation facilitates a discussion of contemporary Welshness on this side of the pond.



Jennifer Johnstone, Ph.D., has taught music history and culture for the past two decades at various colleges and universities. She holds degrees in piano performance and musicologyethnomusicology. She studied among community choirs in North Wales 2008-2009 and has been researching Welsh culture ever

since. Her academic work has been published by the American Bandmasters Association, the Polynesian Society, the Canadian Society for Traditional Music, and the Association of College and Research Libraries. Outside of work, Jennifer plays keyboards in a band (harmonystarband.com) and loves gardening, walking, traveling, and spending time with her nieces and nephew.

Annie Hughes Griffiths: peace petitioner – and much more!

Annie Hughes Griffiths (1873–1942) has recently come into prominence as the presenter of a peace petition from the women of Wales to those of the USA in 1924. Although largely forgotten for generations, her contribution to Welsh life was significant, not least as a folk-song collector. Descended from leading figures in the Methodist Revival, many members of her family have been influential in Welsh cultural, political and religious life. Annie herself moved in very influential circles both in her native Cardiganshire and during her many years in London, and the diary she kept in America in 1924 reflects this.



Until his retirement, Professor Emeritus **E**. **Wyn James** lectured on Welsh literature and culture of the modern period in the School of Welsh at Cardiff University. He was also co-Director of the University's Centre for Welsh American Studies. Among his specialist research interests are popular poetry

(including hymns, ballads and folk songs), religion and identity, gender studies, the anti-slavery movement, and the Welsh diaspora in Patagonia. Professor James is a Fellow of the Learned Society of Wales, of the Welsh Hymn Society, and of the International Ballad Commission. In 2012 he was a Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Fellow at Harvard University.

'A remarkable bird is the pelican': reading an Elizabethan buccaneering ballad

One of the most potent symbols in Christian iconography is 'the pelican in her piety', feeding her young with blood pecked from her own breast – a symbol which Elizabeth I adopted for herself. Composed in 1595, the Welsh ballad examined in this paper is couched as a dialogue between a Welshman on a buccaneering voyage to the Caribbean, and a pelican which offers to fly home to Britain with news of the crew's adventures. The poem is a lively record of an historical voyage to the New World in the late 16th century, and reveals some interesting aspects of the poet's ethnic and political identity.



Before her retirement Professor **Christine James** was Head of the Department of Welsh at Swansea University. Her research interests focus primarily on the literature of late medieval and early modern Wales, but she has also published on the modern period. She won the Crown at the 2005 National Eisteddfod, and her first volume of poetry, rhwng y

llinellau (2013), won the Welsh Book of the Year Competition in the category for Welsh-language poetry in 2014. She was Archdruid of Wales 2013–16, the first female to hold that post, and is currently the Gorsedd Recorder.

The flooding of Cwm Tryweryn and its Political and Cultural Legacy

The seminar addresses Liverpool's controversial flooding of the Tryweryn Valley in North Wales in the 1960s to increase the city's water supply and the resulting impact that the construction of the reservoir, Llyn Celyn, had on those directly affected and for Wales in terms of the nation's subsequent political and cultural identity. The address will also include a comprehensive reference to the construction of the Kinzua Dam in Pennsylvania and New York in the 1960s and its ramifications on the indigenous Seneca Nation.

Tryweryn, the Investiture and Welsh Militancy

The seminar addresses the militant campaign by Mudiad Amddiffyn Cymru which Wales and the border region with England witnessed in the 1960s; John Jenkins' reasons for orchestrating the unprecedented action in the name of Welsh resistance and the protest's political and cultural repercussions.



Dr. Wyn Thomas works freelance in academia, the media and as a respected musician and songwriter, releasing the album, 'Orion's Belt' in 2022. Wyn's three literary titles are considered essential reading for anyone with an interest in Welsh history and the recent political history of the United Kingdom. They are: 'John Jenkins:

The Reluctant Revolutionary?' (y Lolfa, 2019); 'Hands Off Wales: Nationhood and Militancy' (republished by y Lolfa, 2022) and 'Tryweryn: A New Dawn?' (y Lolfa, 2023).

The American Order of True Ivorites

For more than a century, the American Order of True Ivorites played a significant cultural role in Welsh life in the United States. Established to provide assistance to Welsh immigrants and support Welsh cultural activities, by the 1890s the order had thousands of members across the United States. Its legacy continues in the Order of Ivorites award presented by the North America Wales Foundation. Drawing on archival materials and reports in Welsh-American newspapers such as Y Drych, Robert Humphries will discuss the history of the American Order of True Ivorites, some of its leading figures, and its continuing significance today.

The History of the American Gorsedd, 1913-1941

Established at the Pittsburgh International Eisteddfod in 1913, the American Gorsedd was an attempt by Welsh-Americans to recreate the bardic pageantry of their native country on American shores. In this seminar, Robert Humphries will discuss the origins of the American Gorsedd and some of the prominent figures who helped establish it, including David Lloyd George and Rev. T.C. Edwards (Cynonfardd). The presentation will also consider the role of the American Gorsedd in Welsh-American life, the reasons for its decline, and its enduring legacy, which includes the creation of a historic marker at the site of the organization's headquarters in Pittsburgh.



Robert Humphries is director of the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre and the Archive for Welsh America, both located in Wymore, Nebraska. A native of Newport, Wales, he holds an MA in Celtic Studies from the University of Wales, Trinity Saint David. He has presented his research on Welsh-American history at academic

conferences in Wales and North America, and at previous NAFOWs. A regular contributor to Ninnau, he also wrote and co-produced the mini-documentary film, Pobl y Paith/People of the Prairie: The Welsh in Nebraska. He lives in Spring Green, Wisconsin with his wife Jenafer and son, Rhys.

Dan Rowbotham is originally from Llangeitho in Ceredigion, Wales but now lives in Rio Grande, OH where he works as the Director of the Madog Center for Welsh Studies at the University of Rio Grande/Rio Grande Community College.
